



YOUR VOTING RIGHTS IN ARIZONA Election Day: Tuesday, November 5, 2024

In order to vote in the election in Arizona on November 5, you must be registered to vote. Find out if you are registered or if your voter info is current here: https://my.arizona.vote/WhereToVote.aspx?s=individual&Language=en.

Can I vote by mail?

- Any registered voter may vote by mail instead of going to the polls on Election Day.
- You may request a ballot-by-mail online, by email, by mail, or by telephone: https://azsos.gov/votebymail.
 - o Request your ballot-by-mail as early as possible. Counties will begin mailing ballots around October 9.
 - Your request for a ballot-by-mail must be received by 5:00pm on October 25.
- To vote using your completed ballot-by-mail, you can mail back your ballot or drop it off at any ballot drop-box, drop-off location, early voting location, or Election Day voting location in your county on or before Election Day.
 - If you decide to mail your ballot, put your completed ballot in the mail as early as possible. It must be received by 7:00pm on Election Day.

How do I vote in person?

- Early Voting: In-person early voting begins in all Arizona counties on October 9 and continues until 5:00 p.m. Friday, November 1. Some counties may offer emergency early voting through the day before Election Day. For early voting in person, you do not need a ballot-by-mail.

- Valid photo identification (ID) is required for voting in-person early and on Election Day. Your ID must have a name and address that matches your voter registration record. If you don't have a photo ID, you may still vote by presenting two items from this list:
 - o a utility bill dated within 90 days of the date of the election;
 - o a bank or credit union statement that is dated within ninety days of the date of the election;
 - o a valid Arizona vehicle registration, an Arizona vehicle insurance card;
 - o an Indian census card, tribal enrollment card or other form of tribal identification;
 - o a property tax statement of your residence or a Recorder's certificate;
 - o a voter registration card;
 - o a valid United States federal, state or local government issued identification; OR
 - o any mailing that is labeled as "official election material."

If you have photo ID, but the address doesn't match your voter registration record, or the ID has no address (such as a passport or military ID), you can combine that photo ID with one document from the list above with your address.

Can I bring someone to help me vote?

• Yes. If you need help voting, you can bring any person except your employer, an agent of your employer, your union representative, or a candidate running in the election.

Can I receive assistance in Spanish?

• Yes. You are entitled to a Spanish language ballot and assistance in Spanish in the following counties: Maricopa, Pima, Santa Cruz, and Yuma.
