



YOUR VOTING RIGHTS IN FLORIDA

Election Day: Tuesday, November 5, 2024

Who can vote?

- In order to vote in the election on **November 5, 2024**, you must be registered to vote. The deadline to register to vote is **October 7, 2024**. You can find out if you are registered here: <https://registration.elections.myflorida.com/CheckVoterStatus>.
- To register to vote:
 - You must live in Florida, live in the county in which you want to register to vote, be a U.S. citizen, and be age 18 or older on Election Day.
 - If previously convicted of a felony, you may not vote until you have completed your sentence and paid all fines, including court costs and fees, or had your right to vote restored by the State Clemency Board.

Can I vote by mail?

- Any registered voter in Florida may request to vote by mail.
- Contact your local Supervisor of Elections by mail, email, fax, phone, in-person, or online application to request a mail ballot. The deadline for the Supervisor of Elections to receive a mail ballot request is **October 24 at 5:00 p.m.** Find your county's Supervisor of Elections at: <https://www.myfloridaelections.com/Contact-your-SOE>.
- Return your voted mail ballot as early as possible. It must be received by your Supervisor of Elections' office by **7:00pm on November 5, 2024**. You can return your mail ballot by mail or you can drop off your mail ballot at a Secure Ballot Intake Station located outside an early voting polling place.

How do I vote in person?

- You can **vote early between October 26 and November 2**. Some counties may extend these dates. Contact your county's Supervisor of Elections for early voting locations and hours.
- On **Election Day, Tuesday, November 5**, the polls are open 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. On Election Day, you must vote at your local polling place. Find your polling place at: <https://dos.fl.gov/elections/for-voters/check-your-voter-status-and-polling-place/voter-precinct-lookup/>.
- If you have one, you must present a current and valid photo identification (ID) with signature to vote at the polls. If your photo ID isn't signed you must present additional ID that has your signature. - If you don't have a photo ID on Election Day, you can still vote by provisional ballot.

Can I bring someone to help me vote?

- Yes. If you need help reading in English, you can bring a person into the voting booth to help you vote. You can bring any person that you want except your employer or your union representative, or the agent of your employer or union representative. The person you bring does not need to be a registered voter.

Can I receive assistance in Spanish?

- Yes, if you live in Broward, Collier, DeSoto, Hardee, Hendry, Hillsborough, Lee, Miami-Dade, Orange, Osceola, Palm Beach, Pinellas, Polk, or Seminole County, you have a right to a Spanish ballot and assistance in Spanish. What if my name is not on the list of voters?

- If your name is not on the list, or there is a problem with your ID, you have the right to vote on a provisional ballot. Be sure to ask for a provisional ballot if you do not receive a regular ballot.
